This year the flu vaccine is **required** for students in Massachusetts. This vaccine requirement applies to all full-time undergraduate and graduate students under 30 years of age and all full- and part-time health science students. The only exceptions are for students who exclusively attend classes online and never visit campus in person, or those who provide a religious or medical exemption. Regis students who attend any classes or activities on campus, even once, will be expected to have received a flu vaccine by December 31, 2020 for the 2020-2021 influenza season. Students entering Regis January 1 or later must have received the current flu season vaccine before entry. COVID-19 Testing Protocol

Please remember to complete the health and safety tutorial you received by email on November 4. It takes about 20 minutes and provides important information on what is expected of you while on campus. At the end of the [tutorial](#) you will receive a completion certificate, which we ask you to save and provide to the COVID-19 Compliance Coordinator upon arrival to campus for your first test. Please complete the tutorial by November 30. You must complete this before you can return to campus.

Those of you coming to campus will be part of the free campus testing protocol. Testing is required, and how often you are tested is based on how often you need to be on campus. If you only have class on-campus once per month, you will be tested once per month. If you have multiple in-person classes in a week, you will be tested once during that week.

The best way to determine how often your classes will be on campus is to contact your professors directly or to check on [Regis Hub](#). Using the schedule tab, you'll find the meeting dates and times for all of your classes. The tests are done at Health Services in the rear of Maria Hall. Under the supervision of a Health Services staff member, you will administer this quick, simple test to yourself.

Calling all students! It's time to update your contact and demographic information. This means your current address, ethnicity, race, language, and gender.

Self-identification and updating your contact information can be done quickly through [Self-Service and Regis Hub](#).

Up to date and accurate information is important for our COVID-19 testing protocols. In addition, when you report your race, ethnicity, and gender, you help us have a clearer picture of the rich diversity of our community. When we have a full picture of our community, we are better able to design and implement programs and resources that are relevant to our entire student body – we reduce the guesswork and the assumptions. Self-identification also helps us identify any gaps in student retention and success. This is one of the key goals in our [Institutional Action Plan to Address Systemic Racism](#).

Look – we know that you may not see yourself in any of the options. We ask that you do your best to find an option that works best for you. If you really can't find something that reflects your identity, you have the option of declining to self-ID.

Miriam Hospital RN Paul Padula, a Plainville, MA native, originally wanted to become a police officer, an aspiration that circuitously led him to nursing...

“My dad was a police officer and I thought I would follow his passion until he fell ill and spent some time in a hospital,” he writes. “When my dad became ill in the hospital for the first time, I was able to see first-hand what life of a hospital employee was like.
